INTRODUCTION

This brochure is intended to provide you — the students, faculty and staff of Johnson & Wales University — with information and statistics on crime and crime prevention on campus. The brochure describes how the campus security system works and how you can access this system in an emergency.

It covers safety and security in student housing and academic and administrative buildings, the university's policies on alcohol and drugs, and it describes substance abuse prevention and education programs currently in place.

Working through its Safety & Security Office, the university makes every effort to prevent crime on campus. However, Johnson & Wales also recognizes the crucial role that individuals must play in protecting themselves and others from harm. The university encourages all students, faculty and staff to use the personal safety tips provided by Safety & Security's Crime Prevention Unit and to report immediately all crimes, suspicious activities or emergencies occurring on or off campus to Safety & Security's operations center dispatcher or to local police.

THE SAFETY & SECURITY OFFICE

All department personnel are hired in compliance with the State of Florida Laws, Security Officer License, which mandates that "all private security personnel employed by public or private colleges and universities shall, as a condition of their employment, apply to the State for a criminal identification, nationwide criminal records check."

All campus security personnel attend mandatory in-service training to keep up to date on regulations and to improve their skills, and all are certified in first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) through the American Red Cross.

Campus Safety & Security has developed highly cooperative relationships with federal, state and local police departments to help ensure prompt and efficient action in apprehending alleged criminals and preventing crime. Campus Safety & Security also actively participates in local emergency planning efforts toward disaster preparedness.

University security officers aid local police by responding to problems on city streets whenever Johnson & Wales students are involved and our Campus Crime Prevention Officer has developed relations with local community police officers. The director also attends regularly scheduled meetings with local police leaders and area security directors. Campus security officers do not carry firearms and have no arrest powers.

REPORTING A CRIME OR OTHER EMERGENCY

The university adheres to the following policy regarding the reporting of crime:

Johnson & Wales University strongly encourages the prompt and accurate reporting of all criminal or suspicious activities occurring on or near campus. A student or employee or campus security authority who has witnessed any suspicious or apparent criminal action should immediately contact Safety & Security (305-892-7011), a campus security officer, a resident director or local police.

Safety & Security places this policy in its publication, "Campus Safety & Security: North Miami Campus."

Reports of criminal actions or other emergencies occurring on/near campus or in any other building or property owned or controlled by the university or by a recognized student organization, should be made to any security officer at the Safety & Security Office Operations Center or by calling 7011 from a campus phone or 305-892-7011 from an outside phone.

The Safety & Security Operations Center is located at 1705 NE 124 Street, North Miami, FL 33181. The Center is open seven days a week, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Reports can also be made to campus security officers patrolling on foot, bicycle, or in clearly marked vehicles, or they can be registered with residence hall desk personnel who will, in turn, contact the Operations Center.

Safety & Security will immediately evaluate each report and take appropriate actions, such as calling an emergency medical team or reporting to local police. Campus security will also be dispatched to the scene.

Information, signed or anonymous, on any criminal or safety issue can be mailed to Campus Safety & Security at 1705 NE 124 Street, Attn: Captain of Operations, North Miami, FL 33181. Johnson & Wales University is not required to include crimes reported only to a pastoral or professional counselor in the crime statistics published in this report. Students who seek personal counseling on campus are advised that if the student shares information regarding the commission of an offense that the university counselor considers to be a current threat to others, the counselor may release the information to appropriate authorities including university administration, Safety & Security, the local police, or the student's parents or guardians. Students are also advised that the university will release information when required by law.

A Safety & Security column is published in *The WildCat Chronicles*. Crime prevention tips are also included in the column. The Campus Security office maintains a daily crime log listing the nature, date, time and general location of each crime and the disposition of the complaint, if known.

To keep the campus community informed on an ongoing basis, the university will alert the community of certain crimes in a manner that is timely and will aid in the prevention of similar crimes. An alert will be issued and posted for all Clery Act crimes that are reported to campus security authorities, or are reported to the university by local police agencies, and are considered by the university to represent a serious or continuing threat to students and employees.

SECURITY OF CAMPUS FACILITIES

Residence Halls: To protect students, staff and guests, campus security officers patrol the perimeters of residence halls 24 hours a day on foot, bicycle, and in marked vehicles. Additional patrols are assigned to problem areas as needed.

Residence halls are monitored 24 hours a day by hall directors, receptionists, resident assistants and/or security personnel. All visitors will be logged in by front desk staff and both the visitor and the sponsoring resident must leave a picture ID at the desk while the visitor is in the hall. From midnight until 8 a.m. to further control access to residence halls, all halls have exit door alarms; several halls have been equipped with closed-circuit television cameras/monitors, electronic card access door locks, intercom systems, burglar alarms and convex mirrors.

Officers will enter these buildings to take reports and investigate circumstances as reported by students or residential life staff, or if a violation of the student code of conduct is suspected by observations made by officers on patrol. Access is restricted to residents of each building through the university's electronic identification card system. All visitors and guests must make arrangements with a resident to gain access. During school breaks and vacations, campus security officers continue to patrol and check residence halls.

Administrative and Academic Facilities: Safety & Security controls the opening and closing of all academic and administrative buildings. Many of the buildings have alarms.

Timely Maintenance for Security: Any maintenance problem affecting a residence hall, administration or classroom building receives a work order, prioritized for security issues. During 2008, additional outdoor lights, cameras and emergency phones were installed in some campus areas. Card access security systems were recently installed in buildings on campus. As of September 2008, faculty, staff and students must use their university ID card to gain access to any campus building.

Fire Safety: The university maintains a log of all fires that occur in on-campus student housing. In addition, in compliance with the Higher Education Opportunity Act of 2008, the university will publish annually a fire safety report which will describe the campus' fire safety practices and standards and contain statistics concerning the number of fires, deaths, injuries, fire drills, and fire-related property damage within each residence hall and other fire safety information. KEEPING THE UNIVERSITY COMMUNITY INFORMED

A major goal of the university is to keep students, faculty and staff informed about campus security procedures and to encourage them to act responsibly to ensure their own safety and the safety of others. Incoming freshmen students are instructed on how to report a crime or emergency, on the functions of Safety & Security and on the consequences of possessing drugs, alcohol or other

contraband on and off campus.

Safety & Security Guide: Safety & Security publishes the pamphlet "Campus Safety & Security: Providence Campus" for all incoming students, faculty and staff. The pamphlet explains the reporting of a crime, clearly states the university's policy on the prompt and accurate reporting of all criminal or suspicious activities, lists departmental services and emergency phone numbers, and provides tips on safety in the city and in residence halls.

Emergency Notification System (Connect-ED Notification System to Enhance Emergency Preparedness): The safety of our students, faculty and staff is a constant priority at Johnson & Wales University (JWU). The ability to quickly provide notice, accurate information and instructions with minimum delay during a situation is crucial. To accomplish this JWU has selected Connect-ED, a multimodal communication service that will allow JWU campus leaders and security personnel to deliver time sensitive voicemail notifications to our students, faculty and staff during unforeseen events or emergencies.

This system complements our existing campus emergency response plans which are continuously updated to be responsive to both man-made and natural disasters. University and campus leaders have been integrating our computer systems with the Connect-ED system. The Connect-ED system will only be used during emergencies (and for related tests.)

Missing Student Policy: Any student who resides in an on-campus residence hall has the option to designate a contact person to be notified if the student is determined to be missing for more than 24 hours. For all intents and purposes the emergency contact provided on the initial Health Services form will be contacted. This information may be viewed on uconnect.jwu.edu. If a student would like to designate another contact, he/she may contact Health Services for further information and instructions.

CAMPUS SEX CRIMES PREVENTION ACT (CSCPA)

The CSCPA provisions appear in subsection (j) of the Wetterling Act [42 U.S.C. 14071(j)]. As provided in subsection (j), any person required to register under a state sex offender registration program must notify the state concerning each institution of higher education in the state at which the person is a student or works, and of each change in enrollment or employment status of the person at such an institution.

State procedures must also ensure that information concerning a registrant enrolled or working at an institution of higher education is promptly made available to a law enforcement agency having jurisdiction where the institution is located, and entered into the appropriate state records or data system.

In accordance with requirements of the Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act, information concerning registered sex offenders employed, enrolled as a student, or carrying on a vocation at this institution can be obtained, to the extent permitted by law, by contacting the Florida Department of Law Enforcement at 1-888-357-7332 or at www.fdle.state.fl.us.

CRIME PREVENTION

Because Johnson & Wales believes crime prevention begins with awareness, the university takes every opportunity to heighten that awareness.

A Crime Prevention Unit has been established within the Safety & Security Office to help students, faculty and staff understand the potential hazards of campus life. New student orientations cover topics such as crime prevention, street smarts, maximizing safety in the city, sexual assault education, residence hall safety and alcohol/substance abuse.

Programs: Crime prevention tips are published on each crime alert. Campus Safety & Security programs address subjects such as laptop security, property protection, residence hall security, street smarts, travel safety and identity theft. These programs are conducted on a monthly basis during the academic year. Certain safety programs are held on a more frequent basis at the beginning of each academic year. Dates and times for the programs are published on the Security Web site at www.jwu.edu/>North Miami>Student Life>Safety & Security.

To teach students how to prevent all types of sexual assault, including date rape, educational programs are held in the residence halls. These programs are sponsored by the resident assistants and the Office of Student Affairs. The Office of Student Success, representatives from the North Miami Police Victims Services unit have participated in these programs.

Operation ID: As a practical approach to crime (theft) prevention, Safety & Security will engrave valuables such as VCRs, stereos, etc. with a recognized identification code.

Crime Prevention Initiatives: The Campus Safety & Security program, "Silent Witness," was implemented for the purpose of providing our students a means to convey safety and security concerns with anonymity. We continue to emphasize the importance of direct reporting incidents to members of Campus Safety & Security because the changes for successful mitigation and non-reoccurrence are far greater. "SAFE Walk" is a Campus Safety & Security service program. This student escort service is

available in the immediate area surrounding the Main Campus from 7 a.m.–7 p.m., every class day beginning in September and running until Commencement in May.

"SAFE Ride" is a Campus Safety & Security, Transportation Service. This service will be available nightly from 7 p.m.–3 a.m. to students who, for unforeseen circumstances, are without transportation and the travel distance is beyond the immediate area of campus at a time or place where bus transportation is not available. The card-access security system will now be used by all members of the university community. A JWU ID is required for access to all campus buildings on the North Miami Campus and all residence halls.

More emergency blue-light phones have been installed on the North Miami Campus. Additional emergency blue-light phone installations are planned during the coming year. Security phones are located in every corridor on every hall floor and dial directly to Campus Safety & Security.

SEXUAL ASSAULT POLICY

Johnson & Wales University prohibits sexual assault, sexual battery, and other unlawful sexual activity, and offers programs aimed at the prevention of sexual offenses. These offenses are violations of state criminal law as well as the university's Student Code of Conduct. In considering sex offenses, the university refers to the laws of Rhode Island, Florida, Colorado and North Carolina. While these laws are complex (containing a variety of technical definitions, distinctions between first- and second-degree offenses, situations constituting statutory rape, etc.), a summary of the basic elements of sexual assault, sexual battery and other serious sexual offenses in all four states would generally encompass the following:

- Non-consensual or coerced

- Sexual activity
- For purposes of sexual arousal, gratification, or abuse

Non-consensual sexual activity takes place when the victim does not or cannot (because the victim is mentally or physically disabled, incapacitated or impaired) give intelligent, knowing and voluntary consent. While consent can be expressed in a variety of ways through words, attitude or action, a failure to resist does not, in and of itself, signify consent. Coercion includes force or violence or the threat of force or violence against the victim or someone else, or any other means calculated to cause submission against the victim's will.

Sexual activity includes not only intercourse, but any penetration into a genital or anal opening of a victim with a body part or any object. It also includes other sexual contact such as being touched by or being forced to touch (with your hand or any other part of your body) another person's sex organs, breasts, groin, buttocks or anus (whether clothed or unclothed) or being touched in or around any of these places (whether clothed or unclothed) by another person. When any of these activities appears to be for the purposes of sexual arousal, gratification, or abuse on the part of one person and is non-consensual or coerced on the part of the other person, it will constitute a sexual offense.

If there is reason to believe that Johnson & Wales University's regulations prohibiting sexual assault have been violated, either on or off campus, the administration may pursue disciplinary action through the university's conduct review process and/or through any other available procedures.

Johnson & Wales University strives to be supportive and accommodating for all victims of sexual assault. University representatives from a number of departments such as Residential Life (RDs and RAs), Campus Safety & Security, the Student Counseling Center

(including the on-call counselor) and Health Services will make every effort to help in these ways:

1. We will meet with you privately at a place of your choice on campus to take a statement and explain your options.
2. We will make every effort to maintain confidentiality.
3. We will not prejudge you.
4. We will treat you and your particular situation with courtesy, sensitivity, dignity, understanding and professionalism.
5. If you feel more comfortable talking with either a female or a male counselor or representative, we will do our best to accommodate your request.
6. We will assist you in arranging for any hospital treatment or medical needs.
7. We can assist you in privately contacting counseling, Safety & Security, advising, and other available resources, both on campus and in the community.
8. We will fully investigate your report with respect and discretion.
9. We will continue to be available for you — to answer your questions, explain the systems and processes involved, and be willing listeners.
10. We will consider your report seriously, regardless of your gender or the gender of the alleged violator.

EDUCATION AND PREVENTION PROGRAMS

The North Miami Campus employs a full-time Crime Prevention Officer and a Student Success Advisor who participate in sexual assault education and prevention programs focused on risk reduction, sexual assault prevention and responses to sexual assault. Literature dealing with issues of sexual assault is available from these offices.

All residential life staff members are trained to deal with issues of sexual assault. This training occurs both during the summer and during the school year and is augmented by additional information regarding sexual assault in the "Resident Assistant Manual." Resident Assistants help promote sexual assault prevention by participating in educational programs for students in their residence halls. Education programs promote awareness of rape, acquaintance rape, and other forcible and nonforcible sex offenses. Johnson & Wales University takes a proactive stance to educate its student body regarding issues of sexual assault and methods of prevention. Students receive sexual assault education at various times.

STEPS TO FOLLOW IF A SEXUAL ASSAULT OCCURS

If you believe you are the victim of a sexual assault, you should take the following steps:

1. Go to a safe place.
2. Tell someone. Your options include:
 - Reporting the assault to Safety & Security (305-892-7011) or a Residential life staff member (such as your R.A. or R.L.C.); and/or
 - Reporting the assault to law enforcement authorities by dialing 911 or contacting the appropriate police at the numbers listed under "Getting Help" below; and/or
 - Contacting any of the other organizations or departments listed under "Getting Help" below; and/or
 - If you choose not to report the assault, but to seek only counseling assistance, contacting the Student Success directly (305-892-7026) or, without disclosing any details of the incident, asking a Residential Life staff member or Safety & Security to contact the on-call counselor.

Johnson & Wales University strongly

urges students to report sexual assaults to local police and Safety & Security so that the university can take appropriate measures to provide help to the victim and prevent future assaults.

3. Seek medical attention immediately. Both male and female students can be victims of sexual assault. Victims are encouraged to go to the nearest hospital (see hospitals listed under "Getting Help"). Medical attention is critical so that any injuries (including internal injuries) or infections which may have resulted from the assault, can be treated. Getting an exam does not mean that you have to press charges, however, a medical exam will help to preserve evidence if you should choose to press charges at some point.
4. Preserve and record evidence, including the following:
 - Do not wash anything (including your hands, mouth and face).
 - Do not wash or comb your hair.
 - Do not shower, douche or change your clothes.
 - Bring an extra set of clothes with you to the hospital.
 - Record a description of the assailant (including type of clothing, race, age, height, weight, hair color, eye color, distinguishing marks, etc.) and
 - Record where the assault occurred and the description and direction of travel of any vehicle involved.
5. You may seek assistance in changing existing academic and living situations after an alleged sexual assault incident. The university will make every effort to honor your request if such changes are reasonably available.

6. You may seek additional help, counseling, and assistance. People and organizations offering these services are listed under “Getting Help” below.

GETTING HELP

The single most important thing a sexual assault victim can do is tell someone —the police, a friend, a community-based rape crisis center, a counselor. Don’t isolate yourself, don’t feel guilty, don’t blame yourself and don’t just ignore it. Sexual assault, whether by a stranger or by someone you know, is a violation of your body and your trust. The organizations and departments listed below can provide or arrange for immediate support and response, including arrangements for emergency services, if needed; transportation to medical resources; contact with local authorities; information regarding criminal and civil proceedings and/or the university’s student conduct review procedures, as appropriate; advocacy services; referrals/advice about university and community counseling services; and assistance with personal safety concerns.

WHAT ACTION MAY BE TAKEN:

1. Criminal Prosecution: If you choose to pursue criminal prosecution through the courts, the incident should be reported to the police. Campus person-

nel are available to assist you when notifying local or campus authorities. Remember, a police report does not require a victim to prosecute. In addition, the rape treatment center provides services to help and inform victims of sexual violence when moving through the prosecution process.

2. University Disciplinary Action: A sexual assault is a violation of the university's Student Code of Conduct and reports of sexual assaults by students are addressed through the university's Student Conduct Review procedures. Any student who admits responsibility for, or is found responsible for, a sexual assault under the Student Code of Conduct will, at a minimum, receive a sanction of suspension, which may last until the victim graduates. To ensure fairness, sensitivity, and respect for the rights of the victim and the alleged violator, the following are applicable to student conduct proceedings involving sexual assaults:

- The victim has the right to a speedy hearing.
- The victim has the right to make a "victim impact statement" in addition to an incident report. This statement will be considered by the judicial body if the alleged violator is found responsible.
- Both the accuser and the accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during a disciplinary proceeding.
- Both the accuser and the accused will be informed of the final determination of any disciplinary proceeding brought alleging a sex offense and any sanction imposed against the accused.

WHEN ANY ONE OF THE OPTIONS ABOVE IS PURSUED, YOU DO NOT FORFEIT YOUR RIGHT TO PURSUE THE REMAINING OPTIONS. Compliance with the items listed above does not constitute a violation of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (20 U.S.C. 1232g).

DRUGS AND ALCOHOL

The following statement constitutes Johnson & Wales University's policy regarding drugs and alcohol:

Johnson & Wales University prohibits the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession or use of narcotics, drugs, or other controlled substances at the workplace and in the education setting. In addition, possession or use of alcoholic beverages anywhere on the university premises is prohibited, except for lawful use at events, operations, or programs sanctioned by university officials. Unlawful for these purposes means in violation of federal, state, or local statutes, regulations, or ordinances. Workplace is defined as university premises or any place where university business is conducted away from university premises. Educational setting includes both university premises and approved educational sites off campus.

University policies and relevant laws regarding the possession or use of illegal drugs, narcotics or drug paraphernalia and illegal alcohol use are strictly enforced at the university through Campus Safety & Security and/or Human Resources, together with federal, state, and local law enforcement officials when called for. Johnson & Wales University is not, and cannot be considered, a protector or sanctuary from the existing laws of the city, state, and federal governments.

A violation of this policy by a student constitutes a violation of the Student Code of Conduct. Disciplinary sanctions which may be imposed on a student's violation of this policy include, but are not limited to: reprimand, revocation of certain privileges, campus service, deferred suspension, suspension, or permanent dismissal from the university.

CRIME STATISTICS

To ensure that all incoming students are aware of the alcohol and drug laws of the State of Florida, an outline of Florida Penalties for Drug- and Alcohol-Related Offenses is included in the Student Handbook. Copies are available at the Executive Office.

All employees of the university, as a condition of employment, must agree to abide by the terms of this policy. In addition, all employees must notify the university of any criminal drug statute conviction for a violation occurring in the workplace no later than five days after such conviction. As a reminder of the university's policy, a copy of the drug-free policy statement is distributed to each faculty and staff member once a year.

Substance Abuse Prevention: Given the problems associated with excessive consumption of alcohol or drugs, Johnson & Wales offers a wide variety of prevention programs for students — many of them mandatory. The university provides all students with a short educational program on alcohol/substance abuse as a part of new student orientations and there are ongoing seminars held throughout the academic year.

Substance Abuse Awareness: The university's Student Activities Department and the Student Success Team take an active role in raising awareness of substance abuse among its students, faculty and staff. Various events are planned during National Alcohol Abuse Awareness Week and during National Substance Abuse Awareness Week. Students, faculty and staff are encouraged to attend all events, which are publicized through campus newsletters, flyers and posters.

Crime statistics for Johnson & Wales University are prepared by the Office of Safety & Security in conjunction with the university's Compliance Office. Johnson & Wales University compiles its crime statistics using the uniform crime reporting system of the Department of Justice, Federal Bureau of Investigation, including any modifications pursuant to the Hate Crime Statistics Act. Please note that the university's crime statistics include not only crimes that have been reported to state and local police authorities, but also crimes reported to campus security authorities which may not have been reported to the police (for example, minor violations of the Student Code of Conduct or crimes where the victim chooses not to press criminal charges).

The primary source for Johnson & Wales University's statistics is reports received by the university's Safety & Security Office. All crimes involving university students, personnel, and/or property are required to be reported to Safety & Security. Other individuals who have significant responsibilities for student and campus activities are also surveyed. If these individuals disclose any crimes that may not have been reported to Safety & Security, the crimes are also included in the crime statistics.

Finally, the crime statistics include crimes that have occurred in or on non-campus buildings and property owned or controlled by Johnson & Wales University or by an officially recognized student organization, as well as on public property (including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities) that is or adjacent to and accessible from the campus. The university requests information on these crimes from state and/or local police agencies for inclusion in the crime statistics whether or not they were previously reported to campus security authorities.
