Founded in 1914, Johnson & Wales University is a private, nonprofit, accredited institution with more than 14,000 graduate, undergraduate and online students at its four campuses in Providence, Rhode Island; North Miami, Florida; Denver, Colorado; and Charlotte, North Carolina. An innovative educational leader, the university offers degree programs in arts and sciences, business, culinary arts, design and engineering, education, health and wellness, hospitality, nutrition and physician assistant studies. Its unique model integrates arts and sciences and industry-focused education with work experience and leadership opportunities, inspiring students to achieve professional success and lifelong personal and intellectual growth. CAMPUS FACTS

The Providence Campus is the university's original campus, with a diverse student body of 8,564 students. The Downcity Campus, located in the heart of Providence, is home to the College of Business, the College of Hospitality Management, the John Hazen White College of Arts & Sciences, the College of Engineering & Design, and the College of Health & Wellness. A short distance south is the Harborside Campus, home to the College of Culinary Arts.

CAMPUS FACILITIES

The Providence Campus is spread across 174 acres and approximately 2,800,000 square feet of 60 buildings, including residence halls, classrooms, labs, dining halls, libraries, offices,

open spaces, and internship, recreation and physical plant facilities.

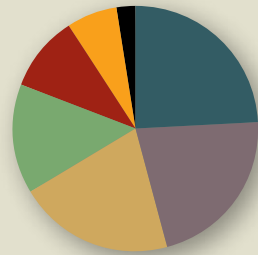

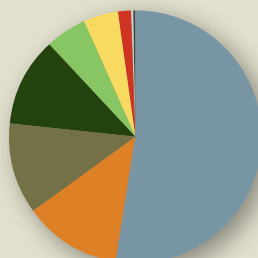

SUSTAINING THE ENVIRONMENT

JWU has revitalized close to 100 acres of waterfront alongside the Harborside Campus through significant brownfields remediation efforts. Improvements include shoreline reconstruction, an Urban Coastal Greenway, athletic fields, and the donation of a six-acre waterfront parcel for an environmentally “smart design” educational and research center dedicated to the protection of Narragansett Bay and marine life.

The Cuisinart Center for Culinary Excellence, Grace Welcome Center, Center for Physician Assistant Studies and John J. Bowen Center for Science and Innovation have been awarded LEED® Gold certification by the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC) for energy and material use and for incorporating a variety of other sustainable strategies.

FINANCIAL AID (2017–18)

JWU is committed to making a quality education as accessible and affordable as possible. The university has taken proactive steps to manage student debt by increasing institutional aid over the past several years. More than 95 percent of Providence Campus students receive institutional scholarships and/or grants from the university, often making an education at JWU more affordable than other universities.

Pell grants were awarded to 39 percent of the undergraduate students enrolled at the Providence Campus.

EXPERIENTIAL EDUCATION

JWU’s educational approach is designed to help students identify a field of interest and acquire the knowledge, skills and experience

to excel in that field. Our unique education model integrates academics and professional skills, related work experiences, community and leadership opportunities and career services. Students develop academic schedules and work experience plans relevant to their career goals, starting in their first term.

Our experiential education model includes career management workshops, a suite of career services, a customized online career management website, work experience tied to a field of study and on-campus recruitment opportunities.

JWU maintains relationships with hundreds of the world’s industry-leading companies and offers a variety of work experience programs. In 2016–17, 2,140 Providence Campus students gained industry experience related to their major.

In 2016–17, 750 employer visits occurred on campus, allowing students to connect with leading companies in their field.

In 2016–17, 1,328 on-campus interviews were conducted.

GLOBAL REACH

The Providence Campus has 8,564 students from 63 countries and 53 states and territories.

The top five international student populations represent People’s Republic of China, Saudi Arabia, India, South Korea and Nepal.

The Providence Campus ranks nationally as the 14th overall master’s institution for the number of international students enrolled. (Source: *Institute of International Education’s 2015–16 Open Doors report.*)

Universitywide, Johnson & Wales ranks nationally as the 21st overall master’s institution for sending domestic students abroad to one of 77 study abroad and exchange programs in 25 countries. COMMUNITY AND ECONOMIC IMPACT

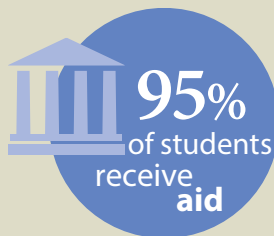
During the 2016–17 academic year, Providence Campus students performed 191,892 hours of community service.

Over the past 10 years, JWU’s Providence Campus has invested \$226,581,190 in construction and renovation.

In fiscal year 2015 the Providence Campus’s economic impact was \$360.4 million in Rhode Island. It is estimated that this economic output accounted for 3,448 full-time equivalent jobs in the state with earnings totaling \$178.7 million.
